## Using Screen Savers With LCDs (2/95)

TOPIC -----

Do LCDs, like those used with the Macintosh PowerBook and Macintosh Portable, suffer from burn-in like CRTs used with desktop Macintosh computers?

Are screen savers recommended for the Macintosh PowerBook series?

DISCUSSION -----

An image left on an LCD screen for an extended period (approx. 24 hours, depending on the image) can leave a "ghost" image. Unlike CRTs, an LCD will recover over time and eventually erase the ghost image.

To allow this recovery, either shut down the system or put it into sleep. The time it takes to recover depends on the original image and how long the image was left on the screen. It generally takes between one and two times as long to remove the ghost image as it took to create it.

With regards to a screen saver, using the sleep feature or shutting down the PowerBook when it won't be used for extended periods should reduce the need for a screen saver. However, if you still would like to use one, be sure you choose one that is appropriate for your PowerBook model.

## Active Matrix Display Models

PowerBook computers with Active Matrix displays include the PowerBook 170, 230, 180, 180c, 540, 540c, PowerBook Duo 250, 270c, 280, and 280c. With these computers, you should use a screen saver image with a completely white background. Below are two screen saver examples for use with active matrix displays and After Dark:

- In MacDraw Pro, or other similar application, create a completely white document by drawing a page-size white-filled box and then saving the file as a PICT image. Use this file in conjunction with the Picture Frame module within After Dark to produce a white background screen-saver image.
- WhiteOut is a stand-alone After Dark module.

Passive Matrix Display Models

-----

The PowerBook 100, 140, 145, 145B, 150, 160, 165c, 520, 520c and PowerBook Duo 210 use a Passive Matrix Display. With these displays, like the monitors used with our desktop computers, you can use a standard screen saver that displays a dark background.
