## Macintosh: Color Startup Icon (8/93)

TOPIC -----

I have a Quadra 700 running System 7.0.1 connected to a third party color monitor. When I turn the computer on, the Macintosh icon in the "Welcome to Macintosh" window appears in black and white instead of color.

I zapped the parameter RAM (random-access memory) and have changed the Monitors control panel from millions of colors to display 256 colors. When I restarted the Macintosh icon returned to color. Can you explain this?

DISCUSSION -----

This behavior is probably due to the color settings being partially stored in PRAM (parameter RAM) and partially in the Finder Preferences file. Some color information may have been restored on the first restart after zapping PRAM but the settings for the startup screen need to be explicitly set by using the Monitors control panel. You essentially performed the procedure outlined below and were successful.

Start with the system running with color on and the startup icon appears in color. Reset PRAM by holding down the Command-Option-P-R keys during the startup process. The Welcome to Macintosh screen and all the desktop icons will appear in black and white only. Without doing anything else restart the system again. The Welcome to Macintosh screen will still be in black and white but the desktop icons will be in color again.

Open the Monitors control panel and change the color/gray scale settings to something else and then back again to the desired setting and restart. The Welcome to Macintosh screen should now appear in color.
