

Power Macintosh 7200 and 9500: Generic Icon on Startup CD 12/95

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TOPIC -----

The Macintosh CD-ROM disc that came with my Power Macintosh 7200 displays generic icons for some of its files. Specifically, the Disk First Aid utility. Does this mean that the disc is bad or there is a problem with my computer's software or hardware?

DISCUSSION -----

The problem you are encountering is a minor one related to the Desktop file on your hard drive or the CD-ROM disc itself.

A critical step in the production of CD-ROM discs is to rebuild the desktop before mastering the disc. Rebuilding the desktop resolves problems with generic icons on volumes that are able to be modified. Most CD-ROM discs are read only and cannot be modified. Therefore, rebuilding the desktop after the disc has been pressed will not help.

The Macintosh CD-ROM for the Power Macintosh 7200 and 9500 computers did get pressed with some generic icons. In most cases the functionality of the files on the disc is not affected. Applications that have generic icons will still launch and function normally.

Documents that have generic icons may not be linked by the Desktop DB to the appropriate application that can open them. If you know which application should open the generic document in question, you can drag it on top of that application, if the application highlights, release the mouse button, and the document will open. If you do not know which application a document belongs to, you can drag the file to your hard drive and rebuild your desktop on the next restart to have the Desktop DB link the appropriate application (if it exists on your hard drive) to the document.

In some cases, you need to have the application that opens a given file on your hard drive at startup in order for the Desktop DB to recognize the file on the CD-ROM. An example of this would be a HyperCard stack on a CD-ROM disc but no HyperCard application on the computer in which you are using the disc. The stack on the disc will display a generic icon until you install the HyperCard

application on the hard drive and rebuild the desktop.
