## AudioVision 14 Display: Connecting the Monitor (7/93)

TOPIC -----

This article discusses how to connect the AudioVision 14 Display to a Macintosh that:

- 1) Has a built-in high density connector on the computer.
- 2) Doesn't have the built-in high density connector.

DISCUSSION -----

Connecting the monitor to a computer that has a built-in high density connector:

- 1) Before you connect any cables, make sure that your computer is turned off.
- 2) Connect the connector end of the power cord to the monitor and the other end to the back of the computer.
- 3) If the back of your computer has the high-density connector simply connect the AudioVision cable to the high-density connector on the back of the computer.
- 4) You are now ready to use the monitor. You do not need to install software if your computer has a built-in high density connector. The software is already installed on the hard drive.

Connecting the monitor to a computer without a built-in high density connector:

- 1) Before you connect any cables, make sure that your computer is turned off.
- 2) Connect the connector end of the power cord to the monitor and the other end to the back of the computer.
- 3) If the back of your computer DOES NOT have the high-density connector, you need to use an adapter cable, a NUBUS video card and will have to install the AudioVision software. (The adapter cable kit part number is M1243LL/A.)

- 4) Connect the adapter cable plugs (monitor, sound in, sound out, and ADB) to the back of the computer.
- 5) Connect the AudioVision high-density cable to the high-density connector on the adapter cable by firmly pushing the cable into the connector until you hear a click.
- 6) Install the AudioVision Software that provides integrated sound and video capabilities by inserting the AudioVision Installer disk into the internal floppy disk drive.
- 7) Click the Installer icon and install the software on the appropriate hard disk.
- 8) Once installation is complete, restart you Macintosh.
